



## Traditional Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Clothing and Artifacts

<b>Boomerang</b>	A long tool with sharp edge made by the Indigenous peoples of Australia for hunting, fishing or fighting using different material such as wood, stone, bamboo and barbs.
<b>Coolamon</b>	A hard wooden tool to increase the distance of a spear could be thrown. It is about 45 to 150 cm long and has a peg at one end. It could also be used to produce fire.
<b>Woomera</b>	A traditional Australian Aboriginal bag generally woven from plant fibres. Usually used by women to gather and transport food, and most commonly found in the northern parts of Australia.
<b>Dilly Bag</b>	A multi-purpose Australian Aboriginal carrying vessel or dish with curved sides, ranging in length from 30–70 cm, and similar in shape to a canoe. Sometimes used to carry babies, food and water.
<b>Loin cloth</b>	A flat airfoil thrown tool designed to spin about to return to the thrower. It is well known as a weapon and hunting tool used by some Aboriginal Australian peoples. It is traditionally made of wood from trees.
<b>Spear</b>	A one-piece garment, sometimes kept in place by a belt. It covers the genitals and, at least partially, the buttocks.
