Talking Points



INTRODUCTION

Today we will be taking some time to look at the issues of gender inequality and inequity, and spending some time in prayer for our society.

GENDER INEQUALITY AND INEQUITY

- » **Gender inequality** is a social condition that stems from the unequal value placed on men and women. Although women make up over half the population in Australia, they are underrepresented in almost all places of influence. Across all positions, women are paid less than men and they are also disproportionately more likely to be doing unpaid work at home.
- » **In recent decades**, women in Australia have made significant strides towards equality with men. In various workplaces and social settings, a growing number of women have taken on leadership roles, forging pathways for other women and girls. However, despite this progress, the impacts of gender inequality continue to very much be a reality for half of the Australian population.
 - Australian women retire on average with over 40 per cent less superannuation than men.¹
 - Australia's full-time gender pay gap is 13.4 per cent, with women earning an average \$242.20 per week less than men.²
 - In 2019 the Workplace Gender Equality Agency reported that only around 17.1 per cent of CEOs or heads of business were women.³
 - At home, the 'typical' Australian man spends fewer than five hours a week doing housework, but the typical Australian woman does between five and 14 hours.⁴

Unfortunately, the gap is widening in Australia. The World Economic Forum annual global gender gap index indicates that Australia's overall pay gap has worsened from 23rd position in 2010 to 50th in 2021.⁵

- » **Gender inequality also provides** the underlying conditions for violence against women, which is just one of the reasons that we, as a society, need gender equality urgently.
- » **When gender equality exists**, a number of things take place. Gender equality prevents violence against women and girls. It's essential for economic prosperity. Societies that value women and men as equal are safer and healthier. Gender equality and women's economic security has the potential to benefit boys and men through increased personal wellbeing.ⁱ
- » **While we as humans do not have the power to eliminate pain**, hurt and death from this world, we as God's people on earth we have been given the mandate to show this world a snapshot of the Kingdom to come. As Michael Frost puts it, "The purpose of our lives is to be like a trailer of an upcoming feature" (see Video option below). In the same way that a movie trailer gives a glimpse of what the film in its entirety will be like, we are to give a glimpse of what the world to come will be like. Our lives are to show a glimpse of God's Kingdom. In doing so, we are to ease the pain and hurt and to comfort in death in preparation for the coming of that Kingdom.
- » **Gender Equity, or recognising women and men equally**, is important to us in The Salvation Army, as it is a biblical concept. We believe that all people – both male and female – are made in the image of God and are equal in value. The Bible teaches the fundamental equality of all people, and that there is nothing that separates us into a higher or lower level. As Paul wrote in the book of Galatians:
 - "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28).

Talking Points



» **Throughout Scripture we see powerful examples of God working through people** – both men and women. We see examples of faithful women who followed their God, despite the fact that the world did not always see or value them in the same way that God does.

» **The Salvation Army has understood the value of women**, and particularly the value of women and men working together, since its very beginnings. Right from the start, our Founders saw women as having equality within the leadership and ministry of the Church, which resulted in women being some of the most influential people of the early days of the Army. Catherine Booth, co-founder of The Salvation

Army, was a strong advocate of equality between men and women. It has been said that “Catherine Booth ... opened the door into female ministry for ... Salvationists of the coming generations. She gave them the right to preach, to break the Bread of Life to hungry souls, and to be servants of all for Christ’s sake.”ⁱⁱ

» **It is always good for us, as an Army**, and as a Corps/ALT/Team, to recognise the important role that women play and how we all – men and women – work together to bring God’s Kingdom to Earth. We celebrate this together, collectively, and thank God for the contributions of all women.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN’S DAY

If you are using this resource specifically for International Women’s Day (8 March), you may like to use the below additional talking points.

Today is International Women’s Day – a day which is observed globally to celebrate the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. We all know great women who have had a significant impact on our lives in some way, and today we get to celebrate them. Right around Australia, and around the world today, people are gathered in Salvation Army Corps, recognising International Women’s Day, and celebrating women in their midst.

International Women’s Day is important because, throughout history, the world has not always recognised the incredible contribution that so many women make to society. On the flip side, the world has often recognised the contribution that men have made to society, sometimes to the exclusion of women. International Women’s Day is one attempt to rectify that – to acknowledge that, in order for society to thrive, both men and women who contribute to society should be recognised for who they are and what they bring to the world.

We are working towards a society that recognises the reality that God loves and ministers through all people, equally. International Women’s Day gives us the opportunity to affirm our belief in these things, and to celebrate the way God is working in people’s lives.

This is not about NOT recognising men and their contribution; it’s about trying to rectify some of the imbalance that has been present for many years. It’s about recognising that women play a vital part in seeing the world thrive, and that we are best when we work together.

Talking Points



WHERE TO FROM HERE?

» The Salvation Army continues to recognise

that women have a unique, important contribution to make to the Church and the world, yet like the rest of the world, we recognise that we can always do better. Through the work of its Gender Equity Committee, The Salvation Army is in an exciting time of reclaiming and reimagining what gender equality looks like in The Salvation Army today.

» There is much that can be done to achieve gender equity and equality.

As a nation we can actively implement policies that promote women's independence and decision-making both in public and private. State and territory governments can set an example by ensuring equitable paid leave and superannuation arrangements for public sector workers are in place so that informal care and pregnancy don't lead to long term disadvantage.

» Community groups play an important role in ensuring gender equality is achieved.

Aside from the fact that they can call out sexism, they can also look to their own leadership and decision-making structures and ensure that women have an equal place at the table.

» As individuals, we can challenge our own unconscious bias

that allows for gender inequality to be present in our own lives. All individuals, irrespective of gender, need to call out sexism – both overt and covert. We can challenge language and images that suggest that women are less than men. We can also challenge constructions of masculinity that suggest men are aggressive or dominant and constructions of femininity that suggest women are passive or subordinate.

» It is vital that all of society works together

to achieve the world that God desires – a world in which women and men are valued equally and given opportunities to contribute all they can to that society.
